### **CALL FOR PAPERS**

Dzimbahwe Journal of Multidisciplinary Research. A peer reviewed journal published by the Great Zimbabwe University, is inviting calls for papers. The journal aims at providing space for sharing and debating issues across disciplines such as Agriculture, Arts, Commerce, Culture and Heritage, Education, Law, Natural Sciences, Social Sciences and related areas. It is published biannually and considers research articles, review reports, short communications, and book reviews as categories of contributions. Manuscripts submitted to the journal should not have been published elsewhere nor be under consideration for publication elsewhere. Papers will be reviewed by at least two expert referees. Guidelines for authors are given below.

#### **Format of Presentation**

- Submissions must be in English.
- Manuscripts should be in Microsoft Word using 12-point Times New Roman and double spaced.
- The cover page of the manuscript should have the title, authors' names, addresses and affiliations; plus email address, telephone number of the corresponding author. The next page should begin with title followed by abstract.
- The manuscript title should be brief and informative.
- All pages must be numbered consecutively.
- All articles should be preceded by an abstract of between 150 and 200 words.
  The abstract must give concise statement of intention, methodology, results,
  conclusion and a statement on recommendations. A maximum of six key words
  should accompany the abstract.
- The length of articles should be a maximum of 7000 words including tables, figures and references.
- Tables and figures should be embedded in the text.
- Evidence of compliance with ethical issues is required.
- The text of the article should normally include the following: Introduction; Methodology; Results; Discussion; Conclusion and Recommendations or Implications.
- Prospective authors should ensure that their manuscripts are edited and proofread before submission.

Referencing should adhere to the American Psychological Association (APA)
 6<sup>th</sup> Edition guidelines. Examples of referencing in text:

Kessler (2003) found that .....

Early onset results in a more severe course (Kessler, 2003).

As has been shown (Joreskog & Sorbom, 2007)

Kisangau, Lyam, Hosea, and Joseph (2007) found [Use as first citation in text.]

Kisangau et al. (2007) found [Use in subsequent citations]

Moyo (2014, p.10) defines development as .....
